### Shout out, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! - Isaiah 58:1

As a faith organization DJAN worked hard this year to ensure a fair election where everyone could have their voice heard. Being a part of the electoral process, especially amidst the coronavirus pandemic, is one of the most powerful ways to live out the commandment to love our neighbors as ourselves. To this end, along with Disciples Center for Public Witness, we launched the campaign **Faithful Decision 2020**. Our aim was to educate and inspire on how to engage with electoral process faithfully. The campaign provided resources on voter registration, rights, protection, and scripture-based issue guides to help make informed voting choices.

# **Faithful Decision**

The political discourse is often divisive which discourages many Christians from fully participating in the political process. As part of Faithful Decision 2020, DJAN sought to show that voting and other political activism is away to organize our communities to pursue a more just and equitable world that reflects our faith values.

DJAN also focused efforts on voter protection because voting is fundamental right in our democracy. With the marginalized communities we seek to lift up, particularly those of color, being hit hardest by voter suppression, it was imperative for people to know how to register, their voting rights and how to ensure their vote was counted.

These efforts were especially important because of the COVID-19 pandemic. This election was not like any we have seen before, with high stakes and unprecedented numbers of mail-in voting. Voter mobilization may not have looked the same but it was even more important to our efforts at DIAN.





During Faithful Decision 2020 DJAN hosted an interfaith panel on voter suppression and protection moderated by Sr. Simone Campbell of Network (Nuns on the Bus). Generation after generation have fought for the right to vote in this country. It is part of our Christian responsibility to uphold that work and never has that been more important than in this 2020 election when roadblock after roadblock were placed in voters' way. With over 1000 views on our pages and many more on our partners', this Facebook live panel was an excellent way to connect with our whole network of activists.

DJAN's own President Rev. Dr. Jack Sullivan Jr. spoke, as did DC4PW President, Dr. Alvin O'Neal Jackson.



## **Remembering Adelle Lemon**

(February 1, 1928 - March 7, 2020)

DJAN joins many others in fondly remembering Adelle Lemon, celebrating her strong commitment to justice, and remaining grateful for her incredible generosity.

Adelle Ringstrom Lemon was born and raised in Seattle, Washington. Raised as a member of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), she traveled at 18 years of age to Europe just after WWII for an international church youth conference. Seeing firsthand the ravages of war contributed to Adelle's lifelong commitment to live frugally, give generously, and work to improve the world.

Adelle married Robert Lemon, a Disciples of Christ minister, in 1950. They had four children: David, Nancy, Mary, and Jennifer (previously known as John). In 1961 the family moved to the San Francisco Bay Area so Robert could study for a Doctorate of Theology at Pacific School of Religion. In Berkeley, Adelle used her time, talents, and treasure to support and organize programs for the American Red Cross, and to develop a psychiatric half-way house known as the Creative Learning Center.

She and Robert had a deep faith in God. In addition to Mira Vista United Church of Christ, she was a member of Berkeley Richmond Intercity Ministry (BRIM), her weekly house church with which she met beginning in the late 1960s.

Adelle was a feminist and believed strongly in justice, peace, equality, diversity, and inclusion. She was active in the civil rights movement, worked with the Black Panthers in Richmond, protested against the Vietnam War, marched for farmworkers' rights, demonstrated with Occupy Oakland, and was a strong champion of LGBTQ+ equality. She also generously supported many justice organizations and causes, including **DJAN**. In fact, Adelle and Robert were good friends with two of DJAN's main founders, Harvey and May Lord.

After her beloved Robert died, Adelle continued to live with her daughter and son in law and their son. In 2015 she moved to assisted living, where she spent her last years. She died peacefully in her sleep, out of pain, in hospice care, after a long and full life.

She is survived by her four children, five grandchildren, her great-grandson, many nieces and nephews, the spouses of her children and grandchildren, a large number of good friends, and many grateful recipients of her generosity. 

## From Our Director

The signs of the times: A large number of deaths due to COVID-19, poverty, and ongoing institutional racism; crucial elections for the U.S. Presidency and the U.S. Senate; economic dislocations and the suffering that comes with it; children taken away from their parents at the southern border of the U.S.; and, as of the writing of this article, a dangerous and divisive demagogue who continues to undermine democracy by refusing to concede an election he obviously lost. All of these things have made 2020 an extremely challenging year.

But there are also signs of hope: More and more people are affirming, supporting, and/or participating in events sponsored by Black Lives Matter. The Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival has been holding successful virtual, physical, and hybrid events featuring impacted persons who have come together to fight poverty, racism, environmental degradation, militarism, and Christian nationalism. A woman of African American and Asian American descent, a child of immigrants, is now our Vice-President elect. The cradle of the South may



send to the U.S. Senate both the descendant of Hebrew slaves and the descendant of African slaves. And the President-elect is talking about and planning to do something to address the deadly power of three pandemics: COVID-19, poverty, and institutional racism.

And so, during this holiday season, serious talk of progressive change is in the air. But to make sure that it does not stay up in the air, DJAN and other prophetic voices must come together, work together, and together demand the change that this moment presents to us.
